You should see the signs for the gardens on your right. Walk in, pass the holly trees, and look for us at the covered pavilion under the tall trees. Come hunger and we'll

talk about food, birds and life. Is there anything else?

Summer Field Trips - Let's go birding!

Field Trips for summer 2002, are as follows:

Sunday, June 23, 6:45 AM

Great Smoky Mountains

Field trip to high elevations in the Great Smoky Mountains. Leader: David Trently (531-1473). Meet in the parking lot at the UT Agriculture School for car pooling to the sites. The trip will include several stops along the Newfound Gap and Clingmans Dome roads. There will be a minimum of hiking. Bring lunch and water. Also bring walkietalkies if you have them. Additional field trips are planned, but have not been finalized. These trips include Alum Cave Bluff trail to view the nesting Peregrine Falcons (early June); Chota/Cherohala Skyway trip (June); Rankin Bottoms (August) and Kingston Steam Plant (August).

When these trips are finalized they will be posted on TN-BIRD listserve and on the KTOS phone hotline, 577-4717, ext. 80.

s I prepare for my trip to southeastern Arizona, I am reminded to set the TN-BIRD listserve to "Vacation mode". I also thought I should remind everyone of how to do this. The easiest way is to go to the TOS web page **tnbirds.org**, click on "Birding in Tennessee", scroll down to "Recent Sightings" and click on "TN-Bird". Now, click "Info page"enter your e-mail address in the box, and then select "Turn vacation mode on" from the next box to the right. Click "Go!" and you're all set! You will not receive a ton of e-mail while you are away. When you return, simply do all of this, except "Turn vacation mode off".
