# 2003 TOS Spring Meeting Field Trips



Field Trip Schedule for the Tennessee Ornithological Society Spring Meeting -May 3 & 4, 2003

*Note:* All trips will depart from the Episcopal School of Knoxville parking lot promptly at 7:00 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time.

### Saturday, May 3, 7 AM

*Trip* #1: *Sharps Ridge, Knoxville, TN* Leaders: **Chuck Nicholson** and **David Trently** Spring migrants are the objects of this trip. Orioles, Grosbeaks, warblers and other spring migrants are expected.

*Trip* #2: *Cove Lake State Park and Cross Mountain, Caryville, TN.* 

Leaders: **Nell Moore** and **Tony Headrick** Locally breeding warblers are expected including Swainsons, Prothonotary, Cerulean and Chestnut Sided as well as many other warblers, orioles, tanagers, flycatchers and spring migrants.

*Trip* #3: *Great Smoky Mountains National Park* Leaders: **Chris Welsh** and **Harold Howell** High altitude species are the object of this field trip. Birds may include Red Crossbills, Common Raven, Black-capped Chickadee, Ruffed Grouse, Pine Siskin, Canada and Black-throated Blue Warblers.

### Saturday, May 4, 7 AM

*Trip #4: Kingston Steam Plant and Gallaher Bridge Swamp, Kingston, TN* 

Leaders: **Wes James** and **Dev Joslin** This trip will cover swamp, pond and field habitat. Expected birds include Red-headed Woodpecker, Prothonotary Warbler, Brown-headed Nuthatch, Grasshopper Sparrow, shorebirds, waterfowl and other sparrows.

*Trip #5: Rankin Bottoms WMA, White Pine, TN* Leaders: **Dean Edwards, Chris Welsh**, **Michael Sledjeski**, and **Leslie Gibbens** This trip will feature a land tour plus a canoe/kayak trip for a limited number of participants. The exact program will depend on the water level in Douglas Lake. Expected birds include a heron and cormorant rookery, Warbling Vireos, Prothonotary Warblers, Willow Flycatchers and shorebirds IF the water level is low enough.

#### Trip #6: Sharps Ridge, Knoxville, TN

Leaders: **Chuck Nicholson** and **David Trently** Spring migrants are the objects of this trip. Orioles, Grosbeaks, warblers and other migrants are expected.

*Trip* #7: Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge, Knoxville, TN Leaders: **Jim Giocomo** and **Harold Howell** This trip will feature a bird banding demonstration. Seven Islands includes riparian, wooded and open field habitat.

### Saturday, May 10, 8 AM

*Cross Mountain, Caryville, TN.* Leader: **Tony Headrick** (Phone 687-9956) Meet at Ingles parking lot at I-75 and Emory Road at 7:00 AM for car pooling to the site. Target birds are warblers, tanagers, orioles, grosbeaks and others. Bring insect repellent, lunch and a drink.

Be prepared for possible muddy conditions.

### Sunday, May 18, 8 AM

Williams Creek, Knoxville

Meet at 8:00 a.m. in the large parking lot at the UT Agriculture Campus, on the corner of Neyland Drive and Center Avenue, for car pooling to Birdsong Street off Riverside Drive.

We will go from field habitat to the (surprisingly) moderately wooded golf course (under construction) to a heavily wooded stretch of urban forest and varying habitats all along the beautiful Williams Creek. The distance is approximately a mile and a half each way. Depending on weather, some areas may be moist or muddy.

### An unexpected life-bird moment and then some

SEED

n March 1 of this year, I was in Rochester, NY visiting a very dear friend. I resigned myself to no birding on this trip, since my binoculars were away in repair land, but my friend took me to a park—Mendon Park—where she had seen people hand-feeding birds. Sounded like my kind of fun, and sure enough, people were hand feeding birds as they have on this particular path for 30 years.

It was a wide, snow covered path

through a corridor of trees, and folks were lined up with outstretched hands full of seed offerings. The birds were lined up too, queuing up to take their gifts. This hand feeding has been going on for so long that all of the area birds are habituated. They were so unafraid, either landing on hands or eating at your feet; it was such an amazing, beautiful sight.

When I held up my hand, the first bird to land on me was a White-breasted Nuthatch, and the Blackcapped Chickadees never stopped coming. Feeding on the ground were White-throated Sparrows, Dark-eyed Juncos, cardinals and bunches of squirrels. And then came a bird that I instantly knew was a new one for me. I got that instant rise of excitement that comes when I lay my eyes on a species for the very first time.

> The bird was close enough that I was able to recognize it without my binoculars. It was an American Tree Sparrow, number 201 on my life list. As I was reveling in the joy that only a life-bird can bring, it got even better, I was soon seeing American Tree Sparrows all around me, 32 at my highest count and they were all nearly close enough to touch. They were absolutely beautiful. I didn't expect a life-bird on this trip, which made

the experience all the more special. My first American Tree Sparrows were a lifebird moment that will bring me forever joy in the remembering.
