**NOTE**: Meeting time has changed. The meeting will start at 6:45 for social time. At 7:00 we will start the business meeting and at 7:15 we will start the program.




The Master, Mark Armstrong, at work banding birds at Seven Islands

#### **Kyker Bottoms Purple Martin Houses**

Many of you who have birded Kyker Bottoms over the years may be aware that there have been a large Purple Martin colony at the house with the large pond just west of the park and near the overlook platform. The homeowner who lived there has recently taken down the Purple Martin houses, possibly to sell the home. This colony of martins will have to move on if new gourds/houses are not replaced. We will be considering purchasing a set of martin gourds/houses and putting them up in the new couple of months. A Martin house system with a pully system that raises and lowers the gourds for cleaning is pretty expensive. #### Letter from the President

January was an incredibly exciting month in many respects but also one saddened by the loss of our good friend Bob Collier at the end of December. Bob's passing will certainly have some impact on the development of Collier Preserve, but it will proceed onward regardless.

If you are a state bird lister you probably are very aware of the incredible month for rare birds in Tennessee. The first state record White-throated Swift showed up in Chattanooga and thrilled birders for a week. About the same time a Bullock's Oriole showed up a few miles from the swift. This species has not been present in Tennessee for 20 plus years so many birders drove to Chattanooga and in some cases, two days in a row.

Next came the Mega bird (again in Chattanooga), a Snowy Owl, the first time this species has been present in Tennessee and easily accessible since the 2009 Spring Hill bird. It is impossible to say how many birders, photographers and others went and saw this bird but it was obviously several hundred. It was even on the tv stations in Chattanooga.

But Chattanooga was not done. A few days later after the Snowy Owl was present a Common Redpoll was seen for a couple of days.

Congrats to two big recent accomplishments. Tom Howe finished 2020 with 229 Blount County birds, a number that would have previously been thought to be unreachable.

Also, DollyAnn Myers just hit 13,000 Tennessee ticks. As far as we know she is the first Tennessean to reach that number. Ron Hoff is not far behind. As you may recall, Ron and DollyAnn were the first to record 100 birds in all 95 Tennessee counites just a couple of years ago.
