

May 2014 France Trip

February Program: TWRA

Southern France is rich in tradition and culture dating back to the times before Christ and the Roman Empire. Birding in this region is no less rich. With the Pyrenees harboring rocky, scree slopes, pine woodland and stunning granite cliffs, it gives us the chance for several highland species and a good chance to see one of the few breeding places for Lammergeier or Bearded Vulture in Europe. The woodlands lower down are also filled with classic species from literature like Common Blackbird, Common Chiffchaff, Blue Tit, Common Cuckoo, and many more. The open fields are home to Sky Lark, Common Nightingale, that sing all night, Corn Buntings and at night it is the hunting ground for Eurasian Nightjar and Tawny Owl. The Mediterranean ocean is close and gives us the chance for some more open, rocky habitat where we found Little Bustard, Red-legged Partridge, Eurasian Hoopoe, Ortolan Bunting and several pipits last time. The vineyards we'll visit date back to the time of the Romans and the rock walls are home to Woodchat Shrike. Wood Lark, and Eurasian Bee-eaters. We will visit the ancient walled city of Carcasonne, some Roman vineyards, a 15th century cathedral and village plus an 8th century abbey. We have a few places left for this tour so please join us for our May 20th KTOS France charity tour as proceeds from this tour will benefit the KTOS. For more details visit:

It sure has been an exciting time with the birds and the cold weather especially trying to keep my hummingbird feeder from freezing. At first, I was just swapping it out every two hours but that got old fast. Once the temperature dropped into the 20s, a light had to be attached to keep the food from freezing. I used an aluminum reflector light with a 150 W bulb. It did a great job but when the temperature would drop to single digits. the light was moved closer to the feeder. Then when the temperature would rise the distance was increased so the food would not become too hot for the hummingbird. I did not realize how much heat these bulbs give off. I noticed that the hummingbird stayed closer to the house when it was the coldest. The Rufous Hummingbird is very cold hardy. But I guess hatching in Alaska with no feathers makes them one tough little booger!

I am excited about the "Wonder of Hummingbirds" festival and we are planning to have a lot more kids activities and speakers this year. Thanks to Paul James, Joel Greenberg will be speaking on the Passenger Pigeon and his new book that was just released, "A Feathered River Across the Sky: The Passenger Pigeon's Flight to Extinction". The 2014 Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) will take place Friday, February 14, through Monday, February 17, 2014. Everyone is welcome—from novice birders to experts. It can take as little as 15 minutes on one day, or as long as you like each day of the event. The GBBC is free, fun, and easy—and it helps the birds too.

Participants will tally the number of individual birds of each species they see during their count period. The data will be entered by each participant at the GBBC website. This year each participant must set up a free GBBC account to submit their checklists, even those who have participated in the past.
