The statewide Tennessee Ornithological Society was founded on October 7, 1915 by six amateur ornithologists meeting at Faucon's French Restaurant in Nashville. A historical marker commemorates the TOS' founding. Not surprisingly, the first chapter was formed in Nashville.

Here in Knoxville, the state's second chapter was created on January 13, 1924. KTOS' founding members include officers H.P. Ijams (president),

Barn Owl plays role in bird club's early years

he following is an excerpt from J.B. Owen's *Our First 70 Years*. "A barn owl nesting in 1923 on Dickinson Island, now the Knoxville

have speeded

exciting. [H.P.] Ijams banded the young owls on July 1, 1923. That winter one of the bands was returned

from southern Alabama, establishing what the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Biological Survey told them was a national record for long distance migration for the species.

The men took pride in the owl, and the official letterhead for ETOS (later KTOS) in its first year featured the head of a barn owl with the number 365\(^2\)236102 and with "East Tennessee Ornithological Society" in a circle around the owl. Very likely Ijams did the art work. Observation of the owl continued and it is referred to in the [club] minutes for several years."

Silent Auction to help build new raptor enclosure

A portion of the proceeds generated by the silent auction at the KTOS 80th Birthday Party will go to the planned new raptor enclosure at Ijams. This will allow the nature center to adopt two additional large disabled and nonreleasable birds of prey. (Most often it's wing injuries that keep the birds from being returned to the wild.)

Currently Ijams has four small birds cared for by the staff. The new free-standing structure will house two larger birds (hawk, owl, vulture). The enclosure will be located near the parking lot so casual visitors will be able to view the adopted raptors up close.

Purple Martins find a home at Seven Islands

Purple Martins (PUMAs) have been reported in the nesting house relocated from the UT Trial Gardens to Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge. The PUMA condo was moved by Wayne Schacher, Jim Giocomo and Mark Campen on February 7, 2004. It's located by an old home site and storage barn on the edge of a recently burned native grass field, not too far from the French Broad River.

Early Bird Club Highlights

- TOS was founded in 1915
- Originally known as the East Tennessee Ornithological Society, KTOS formed in January 1224
- In 1928, bird club dues were \$1, and 14 people paid
- In May 1928, the first newsletter (in the form of a penny postcard) was sent to notify members of meetings and field trips
- The Migrant began publication in 1930 with the first mention of the Knoxville Chapter minutes appearing in January 1934

- The first year, the bird club met on Sunday afternoons; later changed to Thursday evenings. In 1933, meetings were moved to the first Wednesday of every month largely because "Wednesday night is a bum radio night."
- In 1937, the club voted to join Arthur Stupka for his Christmas Bird Count in the Smokies. The count was moved from Cades Cove to a 15-mile circle centered on Bullhead
- During World War II, formal meetings of KTOS were apparently suspended for a variety of reasons

pril 30 – May 2, Chattanooga hosted the TOS spring meeting. Although TOS sponsors meetings throughout the year, as many of you know, the spring meeting is the "big one." Spring meetings generally consist of lots of birding and socializing. You have the opportunity to catch up with old friends from around the state and make new ones. This year's Saturday evening dinner was held on the Southern Belle, the Chattanooga riverboat. Following dinner, keynote speaker Scott Weidensaul treated us to a talk. Although Weidensaul has written many natural history books, in the birding world he is best know for his book on migration, Living on the Wind. If you have not read this, I highly recommend it. It is fascinating, gives lots of interesting details about migration, and it's written in a friendly, non-technical manner.

In addition to the birds and friends, the State Board of Directors met and conducted business. Several important votes were taken. State Treasurer Chris Sloan has resigned, and Mac McWhirter will be filling his shoes. McWhirter comes to TOS with lots of experience and credentials with finances and non-profit environmental organizations; he is a CPA. Danny

Gaddy, of CTOS, was nominated to fill Virginia Reynold's shoes as the next TOS president.

Conservation Policy Committee chair Melinda Weldon reported that they had written and sent comments on several issues in the state. These include TVA's proposal to change seasonal lake levels, mountain top mining, TVA coal mining on Royal Blue Wildlife Management Area and the proposal to remove introduced species from protection via the Migratory Bird Act. The Board voted to donate \$500, from the general fund, to support Chattanooga State's proposal to install a webcam, which will provide live pictures of the Peregrine Falcon's nest on the train trestle at the Chickamauga Dam.

Upcoming meetings: The Fall meeting will be held in Cookeville. There is no host meeting, president Virginia Reynolds is coordinating the meeting. Traditionally, the fall meeting provides the opportunity for a poster presentation for statewide bird research. Next year's spring meeting will be held in Memphis. The dates are set for April 29 – May 1. Paul Baicich, former editor of the American Birding Association's *Birding*, will be the keynote speaker.

Notes for the traveling birder - By David Trently

ou get a call from an Australian friend who will be arriving tomorrow on a business trip. He will have one day for birding in East Tennessee before leaving for a week in New England. He has never birded in the U.S. before and wants to see or hear as many species as possible in this country. You don't want to spend a lot of time tomorrow looking for birds he'll have an easier time finding up north, so...on what birds do you concentrate?

If you don't do much birding outside your local area, you may not realize which birds common to you may be sought after by someone from another part of the world, or even this country.

Look at your backyard feeder. Do you realize that Carolina Chickadees (endemic to the USA) and Redbellied Woodpeckers would be prime targets for your friend, a lot easier to see here than in New England?

Look at range maps in your field guide and you'll find plenty more birds for which you should spend your time searching: Black Vulture; Chuck-will's-widow; Acadian Flycatcher; Brown-headed Nuthatch; Carolina Wren!; Prothonotary, Yellow-throated and Kentucky Warblers; Blue Grosbeak and Orchard Oriole are some of the "Southern Specialties" I try to

show birders when they visit this area.

If you concentrate on these species your guest will likely go home with a longer list of life birds than if you just took him to do some general birding, however enjoyable that would be.

Studying the distribution of birds before going on your own trip can be helpful – both to yourself and to birders in the area you are visiting. Suppose you find yourself birding around St. Louis and you discover a Black-throated Green Warbler nest. These are abundant, right? I sure hope you report it to someone!

Whenever I lead birding tours I am sure to be aware of what is expected in an area. It's nice to know something about a bird's expected presence where you see them. On an upcoming Avian Pursuits Nature Tour to Illinois and Missouri (July 9-11), in addition to looking for special birds like Eurasian Tree Sparrow and Sedge Wren, we will be targeting birds that reach the northernmost parts of their range in the central U.S., e.g., Black Vulture, Mississippi Kite, Fish Crow. These can easily be found in West Tennessee, but it's good to find something where it is not quite so common. BOOK REVIEW

'The Big Year' by Mark Obmascik - By Janet McKnight

big year is when one attempts to see more species of birds from 12:01 a.m. of a given January 1st until 11:50 p.m. of the following December 31st, than any other Big Year record holder has seen. The book *The Big Year* follows the attempts of three birders who independently decided to do a big year in 1998. All three men plunged into counting their species without knowing about each other until well into the year. Each man had a very different strategy and means to accomplish their attempt and I found the race fascinating.

Other publications give a blow-by-blow of big year attempts, such as *Call Collect*, *Ask for Bird Man* by Jim Vardaman, which is a book that proves one can do a big year by buying the expertise of others. And there is one of Lyn's favorite books, *Kingbird Highway* by Kenn Kaufman, which is a book that proves that one can do a big year for under \$2,000, if one subsists on "Little Friskers" cat food.

One aspect of *The Big Year* by Mark Obmascik that I really liked was the inclusion of the natural history of the big year and all the details of whom, how and why.

When *The Big Year* author reviewed Kenn Kaufman's attempt at a big year, he remarked that Kaufman looked like he lived out of a dumpster and smelled like it too. I was lucky enough to bird with Kaufman last Saturday in Nashville and I asked him how he appreciated this comment. Kenn said, "Well, I was hitchhiking all over he country and had very little opportunity to shower, so I probably smelled pretty bad. I probably smelled worse than I do now. Now, I just wear dumpster aftershave." Such is the quirky sense of humor of Kaufman.

It's interesting to ponder the author's conclusions that the man who ultimately broke the big year record is likely to hold that record for perhaps forever, since 1998 was a year of many rarities due to El Nino. Also, the success of a big year depends on hopping an airplane at a moment's notice to see a rare species and plane hopping is much harder to do post 9/11 than it was in 1998.

I found myself entertained by this book, but keep in mind that I devour books about birding and derive great pleasure and information from them more often than not. If you're a bit on the obsessive side about birds like I am, *The Big Year* is a fun account of those even more obsessive about birds than myself.
