Avian Research Initiatives Underway at Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge

Author's note: This newsletter article continues a series on Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge in Knox County. The Knoxville Chapter of Tennessee Ornithological Society has actively supported the concept and development of SIWR, and its membership is providing invaluable information on avian fauna usage of the Refuge, and other technical assistance. The partnership with KTOS at SIWR is most gratefully appreciated.

The vision that created Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge in 2001, guided by lands planning and 6 years of implementation, has lead to significant improvement in grassland habitat quality and overall habitat diversity. Partnerships developed from the onset have enabled educational and demonstration values of SIWR far beyond the confines of the Refuge.

Unique to most habitat improvement projects, the original vision included research objectives that would inventory animal species' usage of the Refuge, and track shifts in animal communities as habitat change and maturity takes place. With the emphasis on grassland habitat improvements at SWIR, monitoring the avian community would underscore the natural community benefits of collective landscape and vegetative cover-type alteration, and validate the efficacy of similar efforts locally, statewide and regionally.

Qualitative monitoring of the avian community at SIWR was an original goal. With public birding forays lead by past KTOS Presidents Dave Trently and Dan Mooney, and data from thousands of hours of individual surveys from many KTOS members, UT researchers and other contributors, the checklist of avian species grew rapidly. To date the year-round avian species list for SIWR stands at 150 documented species, with projections of up to 200 bird species over time.

With recognition of the avi-fauna at SIWR spreading, the original inventory goal was broadened to include seasonal and qualitative surveys. Jim Giocomo, a post-doctoral wildlife biologist at UT Department of Forestry, Wildlife and Fisheries began mist-netting in SIWR grasslands during winter months in 2003, to test methods and investigate migratory shifts in species usage.

Charlie Muise, yet another past KTOS President and Tremont Institute naturalist, set up a Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survival (MAPS) station at SIWR in 2005. With hundreds of hours of support from Jim Giocomo, Mark Armstrong, numerous KTOS, UT-FWF and Knoxville Zoological Park volunteers, within two years the station at SIWR has risen to stand as one of the most productive MAPS locations in the United States. MAPS surveys from May through August establish 10 passive mist-net stations in grassland and edge habitats. Continually monitored during dawn and morning hours, birds netted are removed and processed for protocol and supplemental data, banded and released. A longterm research initiative, recapture data is especially valuable. In the two years of MAPS work at SIWR, more than 1,000 individual birds over 30 species have been captured at SIWR. Additional research projects involving avian usage in native grassland and edge habitats have been initiated by Jim Giocomo and supported by UT-FWF students, volunteers and other partners at SIWR. These initiatives include a northern bobwhite quail.

The benefits of grassland and edge habitat quality at SIWR, and nearly simultaneous monitoring of avian species usage is an incredibly unique, short-term and long-term research opportunity. Management insights gained from this research should stimulate similar efforts in other locales across Tennessee and in the southeast. Collective knowledge applied will fine-tune native warm season grassland and edge habitat management to benefit statewide and regional avian species and natural resource conservation far beyond the boundaries of Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge.

Working on Sharps Ridge Memorial park earlier today, I realized that I haven't been birding in a while. I don't mean that I haven't watched birds as they have come my way, but I haven't really been *in search of birds* since the Christmas Bird Count. This is unacceptable.

Removing litter along the road and other trash (invasive, exotic plants) on the old trail that parallels the road along Sharps Ridge was in preparation of the spring migration that is just around the corner. In the next few weeks, migratory songbirds will be "dripping from the trees" at this premiere birding site in the north central part of Knoxville.

This is an active time for our chapter. Once again, I want to encourage you to get involved. The litter clean up, non-native, invasive removal on Sharps Ridge is a biannual event. Restoring the old trail is a long-term project. I think it will take at least a few years, but the fruits of our labor will produce an off-road trail that will allow us to observe birds and other wildlife, wildflowers and other natural wonders that call Sharps Ridge home. This is just one example of how you can get more involved.

I have asked the nominations committee to search out members who are willing to fill the positions of vice-president, field trip coordinator, newsletter editor and an interim treasurer. If you are interested in filling one of these positions, please let me know. To remain an active member your dues need to be in by the end of March. We need to keep our chapter going strong as we continue our mission of supporting avian education and conservation.

At the last planning meeting, which you all are welcome to join, a request was made to see about changing the day that we hold our monthly meeting. If you have a preference, please let me know. There are many members who have other obligations on Wednesdays and can't make it to our regularly scheduled meetings.


Join or renew your membership
