

# Tennessee Birding Trail

Several locations on the Tennessee Birding Trail will soon be improved and have educational signage promoting birdwatching and raising awareness of recreational opportunities on public lands. The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) provided two grants through its Environmental Stewardship program to Jefferson City and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Foundation. One grant will rebuild the Mossy Creek wildlife observation towers located on Cherokee Reservoir in Jefferson City. A second grant will go towards the development of Tennessee Birding Trail roadside signage. In addition to the partnership grants, TVA installed "Birdwatching Opportunities" signs at seven TVA dam reservations and trails in eight counties in Tennessee. A new wildlife observation pier was also built within TVA's Worthington Cemetery/ Cedar Barrens Trail in Oak Ridge, Tenn. TVA is welcoming Ornithological Society members to lead field trips to TVA public lands. # March Meeting: "Summer Birding on the Gaspé Peninsula in Quebec"

Please join us on **Wednesday**, **March 2**, **2016** for a slide talk by Memphis TOS member, David Hill, on his birding experiences on the tip of the Gaspé Peninsula, in Percé, Quebec.

David has been seriously interested in birds for 64 years. As a junior ornithologist, he was employed by the American Museum of Natural History in New York, The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission in Alaska, The Museum of Comparative Zoology at Harvard, and Audubon Society in Florida, Texas, and Boston.

He switched to aviation as a career in 1964, but continued his interest in wildlife conservation as an avocation. He was the founding president of the Menunkatuck Audubon Society in Connecticut, served on the U. S. delegations to both the United Nations' Conference on Marine Mammals in Norway in 1976, and the International Whaling Commission, in London, in 1974. In 1973, he founded RARE, an international wildlife conservation organization that today has a \$25 million dollar annual budget, and operates programs on nearly every continent.

David and his wife Elisabeth have spent the past two summers in Percé, at the tip of the Gaspé Peninsula, Quebec. He will take us on a visual tour of his favorite birding spots there.

We had quite a fascinating meeting in February with Dr. Buehler of UT expounding on his incredible discoveries about migration patterns of geo-tagged Golden-winged Warblers. One aspect he covered was their ability to redirect their migration to avoid inclement weather such as distant violent storms. We have been given another opportunity to impact local children for birds. Holly Sledjeski Jones of UT Gardens approached me looking for volunteers to help teach children, up to 12 years old, about birds at their annual spring eggstravaganza event being held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Saturday, March 19, 2016 at UT Gardens. Their own volunteers will be doing some bird related crafts and wanted experienced birders to join them and teach identification. A sign up sheet will be passed around at the March meeting. In other birding news, there is a new branch of research that is going to greatly impact bird conservation going forward, and that is mapping a species migration by DNA analysis. Certain regional populations of a species carry unique genetic markers that can be studied from a single feather. Therefore, DNA in feathers from specimens captured during migration or on wintering grounds can be compared to that from breeding grounds and a complete map and timing of their movements can be generated.

This works with the thousands of museum specimens as well as with live captured and released birds. The potential gains in understanding how to conserve many locally declining subspecies is enormous, plus at a very reduced cost.
