Our guest speaker for May is Robert (Bob) Hatcher, Eagle Consultant to the American Eagle Foundation. His presentation will show how the American Eagle Foundation's eagle ambassador, Challenger, opens doors and eyes to our national symbol and the need to address not only America's eagles and other birds of prey but also the critical wild habitats that must be preserved so the species can survive.

Challenger, a non-releasable bald eagle has served as an educational ambassador for eagles since 1989 and has free–flown during the National Anthem at over 280 major conferences and events.

The American Eagle Foundation cares for and possesses eagles and other birds of prey for educational, rehabilitation, exhibition, breeding and release purposes. They breed non releasable adult eagles and release the eaglets they hatch

River Bluff Atop Cherokee Trail in South Knoxville-Leader: Wayne H. Schacher (whschacher@natreserv.com, Home 865-457-4355)

This past December we visited the River Bluff property, part of the Legacy Parks Foundation "Urban Wildlife & Historic Corridor" project, to hike and bird. We documented 29 bird species wintering in the woodland habitats that also include a couple of large ponds and a low elevation trail along Fort Loudon Reservoir. Since LPF's Carol Evans spoke to KTOS this winter, there has been good interest in a return visit to this gem along the South Knoxville waterfront. The birding inventory done this nesting season will continue to lend support and value to LPF's completion of this project. We will also view downtown Knoxville and the river from the spectacular River Bluff overlook. Roadways offer good hiking, with many route options.

Directions: From I-40, take US Highway 129, and exit at UT Hospital/Cherokee Trail. Follow Cherokee Trail uphill past condo complexes to a parking area (on the left) near the blue water tower

into the wild. The foundation presently has six breeding pairs of non-releasable, permanently disabled bald eagles and the staff has successfully released 44 eagle chicks into the wilds of the Great Smoky Mountains area during the past six years. They also finish raising and release eagle chicks that are born in major zoos and have been a party to releasing more than 200 bald eaglets in the State of Tennessee in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency since their founding in 1985.

J.B. OWEN MEMORIAL ENDOWMENT ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR 2009-2010 May 1, 2010

The purpose of the J.B. Owen Memorial Endowment is to honor the memory of J.B. Owen, longtime TOS member known to thousands in East Tennessee through his columns in Knoxville newspapers. The Endowment provides funds for projects that promote the welfare and conservation of birds in Tennessee. This annual report summarizes projects funded, the KTOS contribution, operating expenses, and other pertinent information as to the status of the Endowment and its administration during 2009-2010.

Award History - Previous Owen Award winners were:

- 2002: Foothills Land Conservancy of Maryville, Tennessee, for acquisition of wetlands in the area between the Yuchi and Hiwassee Island Refuges.
- 2003: Jennifer Powers for support of graduate research on the reproductive success and natal dispersal of American Kestrels.
- 2004: Samuel Dement, David Vogt, and Keith Hobson for support of the project on Stable-isotope feather analysis and foreign band encounter comparisons of wintering American Kestrels in similar habitats west and east of the Southern Appalachians.
- 2005: Lyn Bales for support of outreach programs at Ijams Nature Center of Knoxville.
- 2006: Jim Giocomo for support of the project on Northern Saw-whet Owl Monitoring in Knox County, Tennessee; and Mark Armstrong for support of The MAPS (Monitoring Avian Productivity Station) at Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge.
- 2007: Keith Watson for support of the project on Breeding Bird Survey of Soak Ash and Cattail Wetland Habitats in Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Tennessee.

•2008: Than Boves for support of the project on *Relation-ships between Cerulean Warblers, Timber Harvest, and Ornamentation.* Mark Armstrong for support of *The MAPS (Monitoring Avian Productivity Station) at Seven Islands Wildlife Refuge.*

New Projects Funded

Than Boves of the University of Tennessee Department of Forestry, Wildlife, and Fisheries received a 2009 Owen Award of \$300 for support of his project on *Relationships between Cerulean Warblers, Timber Harvest, and Ornamentation.* Jessica Owens of the University of Tennessee Psychology Department received a 2009 Owen Award of \$300 for support of her project on "*Chick-a-dee' calling behavior of tufted titmice (Baeolophus bicolor): A test of the effects of habitat structure and body condition.*"

Project Progress

2004 Owen Award winner Samuel Dement reports that "Our study was published in *Journal of Raptor Research* 43:325-337, 2009. We did acknowledge Owen Grant."

2005 Owen Award winner Lyn Bales reports "The two carriers provided to Ijams with funds from the JB Owen Memorial Endowment provide invaluable emergency housing and transport for our red tailed hawk and our barred owl. We could use the larger one for our turkey vulture if necessary. The smaller box has been used on numerous occasions to transport our barred owl to programs offsite. As the cages for our large birds are in proximity to trees, in the event of cage storm damage, we would be able to safely contain the birds. We sincerely appreciate the gift of the boxes."

Financial Summary

Compared with last year, interest earnings fell (by \$55.38), as the average rate of return on certificates of deposit fell from 3.6 percent to 2.9 percent. Interest earnings are expected to be lower next year. Therefore, donations and other contributions are increasingly important to the financial health of the Endowment. Because KTOS treasury funds were being held in reserve for the TOS 2010 Spring Meeting in Knoxville, KTOS did not make a donation to the Owen Fund. If those reserve funds are not needed, the Committee will request KTOS to make a substantial donation to the Owen Fund after the TOS Spring Meeting.

Presidential Porch

Hi Folks,

Our spring migration continues and every morning I'm out listening to see what new birds may have come into my woods overnight. I am very fortunate to live in a really quiet wooded hollow with few cars and fewer neighbors. I never have a big movement of birds, but it is sure fun finding what new migrants have arrived.

In addition to watching migration, it is also time to prepare for the coming field season. At the end of May MAPS will be starting at Seven Islands. An inventory needs to be done of nets, nets repaired; net poles counted and band supply checked and an order prepared. There are Breeding Bird Surveys and Nightjar surveys to be run in late May to early June. Even though I have been doing them for a few years, I still need to do a dry run of each route to make sure I know where the turns all are and the location of the stops. It really throws you off early in the morning when you expect to find a green mailbox at a stop and it has suddenly turned white or even disappeared. The nightjar routes are only 9 miles long instead of 25 like the BBS, but it is interesting to search out birds that you hear much more often than you see.

Anyone is invited to the MAPS sessions at Seven Islands. We begin at the end of May and continue on Sundays to early August. It is a great way to see some birds up close.

Breeding Bird Surveys and Nightjar Surveys are great fun and I think are a good way to contribute to what we know about our bird life. The speaker for the Saturday banquet will be our state ornithologist, Scott Somershoe, who will discuss the new Tennessee Watchable Wildlife website (<u>http://www.tnwatchablewildlife.org/</u>) as well as updates about Bald Eagle nests. The menu for the banquet includes chicken piccata, spinach lasagna, salad, and fresh fruit. Local members of KTOS are asked to bring a dessert to share at the banquet.
