Help Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge

The Land Trust for Tennessee (LTTN) has secured an option to purchase a 68-acre parcel adjacent to the Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge. As you know, this refuge is home to the largest winter flock of Sandhill cranes in the southeast US outside of Fla. and is used by the reintroduced eastern population of Whooping cranes as a stopover during the migration periods and, at times, for part of the winter. This refuge is also home to the Tennessee Sandhill Crane Festival. This parcel was very close to being developed for a subdivision.

Fortunately for all friends of the Refuge and its wildlife, the LTTN will help purchase the parcel to add to the public wildlife lands managed by the TWRA. TWRA is contributing the maximum amount of funds they have available, \$250,000, to the project. LTTN is committed to help TWRA raise the remaining ~\$150,000 that is needed to secure this parcel and protect this important habitat. They have only three and a half months to raise the needed funds.

LTTN hopes people are willing to make tax-deductible donations, at any level, and also help them think of other ways they can raise the needed funds. They have some early indications of local foundation interest, but they are reaching out to as many local organizations and individuals to accomplish this important and critical task. Knox County Fall Bird Count

The annual Knox County Fall Bird Count will be held on **Sunday, September 30, 2012**. Everyone is encouraged to participate by joining a group in the field or counting birds in your backyard and neighborhood (for those living in Knox County). For more information on how you can participate, please contact the compiler, Dean Edwards (see below for contact information). It is also very important to contact the compiler if you normally work the count but are unable to do so this year so that we can get someone else to cover your territory. Your tallies need to include the same information as for the Fall Migration Bird count and what time of day you counted. Please submit your count results to the compiler as soon as possible.

Fall Migration Bird Count

Each September, birders take part in the fall North American Migration Count (NAMC) to count birds in the field and create a snapshot of migration across the continent. This year the count will be on **Saturday**, **September 15**, **2012**. You can participate by taking part in counts scheduled in Anderson and Blount counties, or by counting in your own county if you live elsewhere. Everyone is encouraged to participate by joining a group in the field or by counting birds in one's own backyard. There is no cost to participate, and all experience levels are encouraged to participate!

For specific contact information of the county compilers, see below. The county compilers can also answer questions about the count, give you a designated area to cover, or get you connected to a group that is already going out

You will need to submit the following data to the compiler after the count.

- checklist with the tally for each species identified
- miles covered and hours spent counting by car, by foot, and by other means (boat, etc.) and owling
- hours spent watching feeders (if any)
- weather data and temperatures
- number of birding parties
- number of participants, their names, and their contact information
- location(s) where you counted
- documentation of any rare species, including written details and photos (if possible)

Putting your tally sheet of birds in taxonomic order really helps compile the data. For a checklist, visit www.tnwatchablewildlife.org/files/0986_bird_card.pdf.

Get Out and Get Birding! September Field Trips

Rankin Bottoms

Sunday, September 2 @ 7:00 a.m.

We will meet at the Stokley Building at Cedar Bluff at 7:00 a.m. to drive to Rankin Bottoms. (Note: The Stokley Building is located at 320 North Cedar Bluff Road, Knoxville, Tenn.) If you would like to join us at the site, we plan on being there for a while. For directions and a site description, see http://www.tnbirds.org/IBA/SitePages/Rankin.htm.

Join us for a trip to Rankin Bottoms where we will search for several sand-piper (peep) species including the Western, Least, Semipalmated, White-rumped, Baird's, and Spotted. We may be able to see Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs. We will check through the herons for an odd one in the bunch. There is a chance we may find a Double-crested Cormorant, Belted Kingfisher, and several other odd shorebirds depending on water depth. If a storm moves up the eastern US coast, we may expect more species to be pushed our way. Bring snacks and water as there are no eating facilities nearby.

The River Bluff atop Cherokee Trail (Legacy Parks Foundation) Thursday, September 20 @ 9:00 a.m. Leader: Tony King, (865) 988-6172

We will meet at the parking area for the River Bluff at 9:00 a.m. To reach the site from I-40, take U.S. Hwy I29 South (Alcoa Highway) and exit at the UT Hospital/Cherokee Trail. Follow Cherokee Trail uphill past the condominium and apartment complexes to the parking area on the left side of the road near the blue water tower.

We will expect a variety of bird species in this 70-acre woodland habitat that includes two large ponds, a ridge top, and a low elevation trail along the Tennessee River. The overlook has a beautiful view of downtown Knoxville high above the river on Cherokee Bluff. This area is a historic Civil War site of the mostly forgotten Battle of Armstrong's Hill, a key Civil War battle in the defense of Knoxville.

Foothills Parkway

Sunday, September 30 @ 8:00 a.m.

We will meet at the Foothills Parkway turnaround at the beginning of road in Walland, Tenn. at 8:00 a.m. We will start our trip by looking for migrants around the parking lot such as Hermit, Grey-cheeked, and Swainson's Thrushes with some confusing fall warblers. We will then move to higher areas (upper parking lots) once the thermals begin and set up our viewing area and spend the day watching for individual species within kettles of raptors. There should be Broad-winged, Red-tailed, and Red-shouldered Hawks. There is a chance we will see a Peregrine Falcon, a species that has been seen in the past, along with Cooper's and Sharp-shinned Hawks. Bring snacks and water as there are no eating facilities nearby.


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Sponsor a Local Classroom with Activity Books!

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HIWASSEE WILDLIFE REFUGE

The Land Trust for Tennessee and Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) need your help to purchase 68 acres of critical wildlife habitat that adjoins TWRA's Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge in Meigs County.

Located along Blythe Ferry Road near the confluence of the Hiwassee and Tennessee Rivers, this peaceful stretch of tall grasses was slated for a high density residential development with a waste water treatment facility. Just imagine the difficulty in maintaining the integrity of the Refuge under those circumstances!

This essential acreage along the Hiwassee River corridor supports the annual Sandhill Crane migration, when thousands of the birds come to the Refuge each winter. In addition to the Sandhill Crane Festival held at the Refuge every year, Blythe Ferry was a major departure point for The Trail of Tears. The proposed development would have ruined the historic context for visitors to experience the old wagon road leading to the ferry, and to the Cherokee Removal Memorial Park that adjoins these 68 acres, and severely impacted the home to cranes and other wildlife.

We have a limited time to protect this property and the future of the Refuge. Everyone can be a part of the historic past and exciting future of Blythe Ferry.
