Fun Facts:

- Pileated Woodpeckers play an important role within their ecosystems by excavating cavities that are subsequently used by many other species including birds, small mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and invertebrates.
- The oldest known Pileated Woodpecker in the wild was 12 years 11 months old.
- Woody Woodpecker was inspired by the Acorn Woodpecker which resembles the Pileated Woodpecker.



Bird of the Month Pileated Woodpecker

The Pileated Woodpecker is the largest woodpecker in North America (with the exception of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker). Its loud ringing calls and distinctive plumage make it a familiar bird in rural Tennessee. The Pileated Woodpecker is non-migratory and can be found in deciduous and coniferous forests across the eastern half of the United States, central Canada, and south to California.

Description: This crow-sized bird has a black body, a red crest on its head, and a broad white stripe on the face extending from the base of the bill down the neck. In flight, the top of the wing shows a patch of white at the base of the primaries, the underwing linings are white, and the trailing edge of the wing is black. The bill is thick and silvery gray. The sexes are similar; however the male has a red crown and forehead and red in the black mustache stripe. The female has a gray to yellow-brown forehead and no red in the mustache stripe.

Length: 16.5" **Wingspan:** 29" **Weight:** 10 oz **Voice:** The call is a boisterous outburst of notes changing in pitch, loudness, and rhythm.
